RSA Transitions

The RSA Transitions project, which aims to bring back to life government-owned Everthorpe Hall and 45-acres of farmland behind HMP Humber has completed its feasibility phase. This looked at the costs of refurbishing the Hall and creating a training centre, workshops, offices and a field learning centre amongst other things. The conclusions of the study will be published shortly and the team will share this with the local community.

The master plan - which was developed in consultation with the local community, local services, the prison, offenders and their families - sets out costed plans for refurbishing the site with the aims of strengthening rehabilitation, getting more offenders to resettle and secure work and benefit the local community.

Subject to further funding, in the next stage of work, the project team will continue to engage the Government on leasing the land and will be working to secure planning permission, raise funds for the refurbishment.

It will also be working within the prison to develop social enterprises in the short term, improve services to prisoners' families and develop a new way of assessing people's ability to resettle after prison.

The Transitions team would like to take this opportunity to thank the local communities of North and South Cave as well as the residents of the Beck Road estate for their engagement in the project and their patience in developing what will be the first project of its kind.

South Cave Preservation Society

Are you a victim of Vine Weevil?

It has come to the notice of the committee of the South Cave Preservation Society that a number of gardeners in the village have lost plants or had them cosmetically damaged by Vine weevils.

Plants (especially plants grown in pots) can appear fit and healthy one day and dead the next for no apparent reason.

If the pot is emptied or the plant dug out of the ground with a reasonable root ball the cause of the sudden death may be apparent from the presence of small creamy coloured grubs with a distinctive brown head.

These are the grubs of the vine weevil which eat through the root system and cut off the supply of water and nutrient to the plant system above ground.

These grubs are generally around 6 to 10mm long and should not be confused with the much bigger but similarly coloured grub of the stag beetle. The stag beetle should be encouraged as it is endangered but despite its aggressive appearance it is also a major beneficial insect in the garden as it consumes many pests.

The adult vine weevil looks like a small beetle but with a lighter colouring.

The adult causes damage to the leaf structure of many plants including Rhododendron, Bergenia and Euonymus to name a few. The leaf damage is commonly in the form of scalping around the edges of the leaf and is therefore mainly cosmetic.



The damage should not be confused with slug damage, which can be in the form of holes at random places across a leaf, but could be confused with damage from the leaf cutter bees.

The Preservation Society would be interested to hear from anyone in the village who has had the misfortune to encounter these pests. (Vine weevil). Unfortunately Vine Weevils are not eradicated easily and appear to be immune to most commonly used pesticides. Two products seem to be successful at treating the pest, but these are not inexpensive and require careful timing of application. The two most readily available treatments are Provado, (which is also an effective way of eradicating Lily Beetle and available from most garden centres), and Nematodes, (which are normally obtained via the internet at times of the year when the grubs are most likely to be present). Other more specialist treatments are available.

If there are sufficient numbers of gardeners in the village and surrounding areas who are experiencing this problem and would like to group together to obtain treatments etc, please contact a member of the South Cave Preservation Society. If there is wide interest it is proposed to get in touch with the Royal Horticultural Society to seek advice, assistance and greater publicity.

South Cave war Memorial – Your views count

Until around 1958 South Cave had a very impressive War Memorial located on the existing Plinth outside the main entrance to Cave Castle.

For a number of years the South Cave Preservation Society has had a sub-committee which has been investigating the possibility of either reproducing the original memorial (but in a more robust material) or commissioning a new design of a more contemporary form.

It is envisaged that a new feature could cost in the region of £25,000, which it is intended would be raised locally and by accessing the various grants and charitable/philanthropic organisations and foundations.

Before the sub-committee commit to a great deal of time and effort in fund-raising and organising and commissioning a new work, it was agreed by the main committee of the Preservation Society that we should solicit the views of as many interested persons as possible, either as groups or individuals.

The preservation Society would therefore like to hear the views with regards to the need to have another memorial, what form if any such memorial should have, including whether this should be of a non-religious form, and the urgency. If a memorial is to be commissioned it is considered that this should be achieved so that dedication could take place on an appropriate date in 2018 to mark 100 years since the end of the First World War.

A suggestion that has been made further to a comment recently received by the Preservation Society is that it might be possible to procure a refurbished piece of a memorial sculpture, which would be seen as a cost effective way of providing a marker in a 'green' way, without wishing to take away anything from the purpose of the memorial.

Please communicate your views to a representative of either the Preservation Society or the Parish Council or hand them in at the Library.

If any member of the community has any ideas for a design or wishes to become involved, please also contact a member of the Preservation Society.

The Preservation Society would be especially pleased to hear from the normally silent majority as well as the more vocal minority.

Once a range of views have been received and subject to there being sufficient interest, we would propose to hold an exhibition where comments, ideas and proposals would be displayed in an anonymous way.
